Early School Summer Activities

Fine Motor Skills:

Scissors and Play-dough

Let your child use scissors to cut play-dough. This helps build fine motor strength and also helps them to learn to use scissors.

Magazine Collage

Cut pictures from magazines and glue them onto a piece of construction paper. You can have your child cut out certain things, such as "things that begin with a certain letter" or "red things" or "ocean animals", etc.

Lacing

You can make your own lacing tools at home with cardstock, hole puncher and yarn (shoe laces) or they are available at most stores. Have your child practice lacing the yarn or shoe laces through the holes.

Literacy

Make an at-home writing kit for your child to practice writing:

Pens Colored Pencils Thin Markers

Plain White Paper Colored Copy Paper Envelopes

Stapler Tape Dry Erase Board

Magna Doodle Notepads Index Cards

Pipe Cleaner Letters

Use pipe cleaners to form letters by bending them

Letter memory Game

Place 2-4 letter magnets (or paper with letters written on them) on a tray. Cover them up with a cloth and take one away. Uncover the cloth, and ask your child which on is missing. You can also have your child write the letter on a piece of paper or dry erase board.

Letter Sound Basket

Give your child a basket and ask him or her to collect objects from around the house that begin with that particular letter.

Math

Candy Math

Have your child use colored candy, such as gummies, M & M's, Skittles, Jelly Beans, etc. Use them for sorting, counting, and pattern activities.

Number Basketball

Write numbers on pieces of paper and place them on the floor, Place a trash can nearby. Call out a number for your child to find, crumble up and toss into trash can.

Path

These games are great for counting practice because a child rolls the dice or spins a spinner and counts how many spaces to move. You can buy these path games or create your own!

Science

Make a Science Kit

Seashells Rock Collection Kaleidoscopes

Magnifying Glass Bug Box/Critter Cage

Binoculars Science Journal Thin Markers

Nature Walk

Go on a nature walk in your neighborhood or in the woods. Collect small sticks, rocks, leaves and wildflowers,. You can make a nature collage or draw and write about them in their journal.

Magnets

Let your child experiment with carious objects and classify them as magnetic or non-magnectic. You can use a paper clip, screw, penny, pen cap, cork, crayon, etc.
